

The coronavirus vaccine is a medicine that can help keep you safe from coronavirus.


Things you can do to stay safe from coronavirus



There are lots of things you can do to stay safe from coronavirus.







- follow the rules from the government
- wear a clean face mask
- keep 2 big steps away from other people
- wash your hands often



• cover coughs and sneezes.

About the coronavirus test



The coronavirus test

• is free



- is quick to do
- does not hurt
 - is for everyone staying or living in Australia.



• a refugee or asylum seeker




• a migrant





- here on a visa
- an international student.





The coronavirus test does **not** test for any other disease or illness.

You need to bring **identification** when you go for a coronavirus test.

Identification means a card or letter that shows who you are. For example, a passport or licence.

Why you should get the coronavirus vaccine

You can get a vaccine for coronavirus.

The coronavirus vaccine is medicine that can

- help keep you safe from coronavirus
- help keep others safe from coronavirus



 stop you from getting very sick if you do still get coronavirus.



We need lots of people to get the vaccine so everyone can stay well.



You can get information about the vaccine from your doctor.

Why is the coronavirus vaccine important?



The vaccine can help keep everyone safe.







You might have to have the vaccine to go to

- other countries
- public places like libraries or cafes
- work.

Who can get the coronavirus vaccine?









- The coronavirus vaccine is free for everyone, including
- refugees
- asylum seekers
- migrants
- people here on a visa
- international students
- people with disability.





When you get a coronavirus vaccine

• you do **not** need a Medicare card



you do **not** need an Individual
Healthcare Identifier



• it will **not** affect your visa status



• it will **not** affect your government payments.



It is safe to get the coronavirus vaccine even if


• you have already had coronavirus



• you are on hormone therapy



- you are taking pre-exposure prophylaxis medicine or PrEP
- you are on antiretrovirals.



You might **not** be able to have the vaccine if you have a health problem.

You **must** tell your doctor about all of your health problems **before** you get the vaccine.



Your doctor will tell you which coronavirus vaccine is best for you.

How to book a coronavirus vaccine appointment



You can book an appointment to get the coronavirus vaccine

• online




- or
- over the phone.

You can call the Coronavirus Hotline to book an appointment on 1800 675 398.



Press 0 if you need an interpreter.

An interpreter is someone who speaks English as well as the same language as you.



If you have a disability

 you do **not** need to book an appointment to get the coronavirus vaccine at a vaccine site




• a **Disability Liaison Officer** can help you get a vaccine.



- A Disability Liaison Officer can help you
- know where to go for an appointment



- book someone to come to your home to give you the coronavirus vaccine
- help you understand what will happen.


When you book the appointment you will

be asked

• how old you are



• what your ethnicity is



• where you were born



• what language you speak.



The questions help the government know how to support different communities to get the coronavirus vaccine.









You can bring someone with you for support.

You should wear clothes that make it easy to put the vaccine in your arm.

A nurse or doctor will put a needle into your arm to give you the vaccine.

You can tell the nurse or doctor if you are worried about the needle and they will help you.

The vaccine is very quick.

It might sting a little bit when you get the needle.



After your vaccine you might

have a sore arm



- have a mild fever
- feel tired.

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If you are worried or feel sick you can see your doctor after your vaccine.

All vaccines in Australia are safe.



For the vaccine to work well you need to have the vaccine

• 2 times

and

• on different days.



When you have the first vaccine someone will tell you when you can have the vaccine again.

If you feel sick after the coronavirus vaccine

You might have **side effects** from the vaccine.

Side effects are when you feel a little bit sick from the medicine in the vaccine.



Side effects might make you

• feel tired



• have muscle aches



- have headaches
- have joint pain
- have fever and chills.





You might have side effects after

- the first vaccine
- the second vaccine
- both vaccines.



Side effects from the coronavirus vaccine

• are normally mild

SUN	MON	TUE	WED	THU	FRI	SAT

• normally last for 1 or 2 days.

There is a small chance you might have more serious side effects.




You should call 000 if you

- cannot breath properly
- have a very fast heartbeat.



You can call any day at any time.

Will your vaccine from Australia be accepted in other countries?



Different countries will have different rules about travelling after you get your coronavirus vaccine.

You will be able to get a **vaccine passport** that can be used in other countries.



A vaccine passport is a document from the government that says you have had both vaccines.

How you can show that you have

had a coronavirus vaccine

A certificate is a legal document that says you have had the vaccine.



Your certificate can be

- online
- printed on paper.


